3. Corinth in Paul's Time

Corinth's Geography: Isthmus connecting mainland Greece/Achaea with Peloponnese

Roman: massive Acropolis and Latin inscriptions (and language)

Temples to Roman and Greek gods as well as a "synagogue of the Hebrews"

Destroyed in 146 BCE after rebellion

Refounded by Julius Caesar in 44 BCE and became capital of Achaea

Trade route north/south by road and east/west by boat (diolkos)

Large influx of non-Roman, Greek speaking migrants

Host of the Isthmian Games

4. Paul's Time in Corinth

Paul spent time in Corinth around 50/51 and again around 55/56 CE

Initially travelled to Corinth via Athens

Acts 18.1-18 is the Acts account of Paul's first visit to Corinth

Was a tentmaker, connecting with Priscilla (Prisca) and Aquila who were Jews from Rome,

expelled after the Edict of Claudius (49 CE) – see 1 Cor 16.19; Acts 18.2-3

Stayed initially for 18 months

Was brought before Proconsul Gallio (who served 51-52 CE per Delphi inscription)

Paul's community was diverse and met in homes for meals and worship (1 Cor 11.17-34; Rom

16.23)

Size of the church thought to be 30-50 but as many as 100

Paul names 17 individuals within the Corinthian community

The social status of the community is much debated, see 1 Cor 1.26-28

After Paul leaves Corinth, Apollos teaches there

5. The Corinthian Correspondence

There are at least 4-5 and as many as 7 Pauline letters to Corinth, with several also written by the Corinthians including: the lost letter of 1 Cor 5.9; 1 Corinthians; the "letter of tears" of 2 Cor 2.4; 2 Cor 1-9; 2 Cor 10-13

2 Corinthians is possibly a compilation of 2-4 letters

The letters bring to light the problems within a community that is culturally fraught and fractious, located in a challenging pluralistic context (see 1 Clement)

Paul's sources for his letters are multiple:

Chloe's people (1 Cor 1.11) – Letter from Corinth (1 Cor 7.1) with accompanying delegation – Apollos (1 Cor 16.12) – Stephanas, Fortunas, and Achaicus (1 Cor 16.17) – Timothy (1 Cor 4.17) – a second visit (2 Cor 2.1; 7.2) – Titus (2 Cor 7.6-7)

6. The Corinthian Community

Key issues: unity and reconciliation

Issues of social status?

Varied backgrounds: synagogue leader/patron (Crispus); owner of large home (Gaius);

oikonomos (Erastus: also the aedile?); Jews (Aquila, Priscilla, Crispus); Romans (Fortunatus;

Gaius, Titus Justus; Quartus); Greeks (Stephanus, Erastus, Achaicus)

7. 1 Corinthians

Overview

16 Chapters, by Paul and Sosthenes (1.1); 1 unified letter

Written from Ephesus between 54-57 CE

List of practical and theological problems in 4 sections (and then conclusion)

Outline

1-4: Division and response to reports about factions from Chloe's people

5-11.1: Sexual and Moral issues, including responses to issues raised in Corinthian letter (7.1) and a long section on meat offered to idols (8.1-11.1)

11.2-14.40: Worship and communal gatherings

15: The Resurrection of the Body

16: Conclusion: including the Collection, Travelogue, and Paul's signature

By Paul and Timothy; authentic but not likely 1 unified letter

Options for division include

Issues of 1 Cor do not appear to continue into 2 Cor

Significant focus on Pauls' apostleship and the Collection

9. The Corinthian Situation: 1 Corinthians 1-4 and issues in the Corinthian letters

Gerd Theissen and social scientific approach is one of many ways to approach factions 1 Cor 1.11; 1 Cor 1.26-28; 1 Cor 4.6 are pointed to as evidence of division in the community Social stratification in relation to:

The Lord's Supper (ch 11)

Idol meat (ch 8)

Lawsuits (ch 6)

Speaking in tongues (ch 14)

Other options to explain divisions in the community: eschatology, etc.
